#### What is Collaboration?

The merging of perspectives and expertise

- 1) by multiple stakeholders,
- 2) through an open and interactive process,
- 3) to accomplish a shared goal that a single stakeholder cannot solve alone



## Components of Collaboration

#### **Process**

- Working from the same information
- Working toward the same outcomes
- An agreed-upon process
- Everyone participates

- Voluntary participation
- Local perspective
- Representation of all stakeholders
- Everyone participates
- Empowered process

- Resolved tensions


#### Outcomes

- Personnel change




# Where is the Virgin River

#### Crosses three states

- Originates in Zion NP and ends at Lake Mead NP
- Currently only focused on the watershed within Arizona and Nevada


~60 miles (96km) in our focus area for a total 152 miles (244km)

- ~1.3M acres (HUC 8)
- >75% area in focus area



## Why are we working here?

- Two federally endangered fish –
   Woundfin and Virgin River Chub
- One endangered bird –
   Southwestern Willow Flycatcher
- Virgin River flows into Lake Mead and contributes to water supply for Southern Nevada and other downstream users

## Lower Virgin River Challenges

- Anti-government sentiment
- History of failed planning attempts resulted in wariness and distrust
- Planning fatigue
- Balancing rural-urban dynamics with a limited water supply



## Overcoming Challenges

- Neutral facilitator
- Balance between governmental and local participants; limit how many from each group
- Seeking feedback



## **Workshop Outcomes**

#### Consensus Driven

1st workshop September 2017

- Mission, Vision, charter and drafted targets - through a series of break-out groups
- Expert presentations to establish baseline knowledge for all participants
- Feedback from the group resulted in changed locations and length of meetings

## Consensus Driven 2nd workshop October 2017

- Mission, vision, charter and drafted targets were finalized
- Invited agency decision-makers to show agency support
- Drafted strategies
- Worked to strengthen relationships with key partners

- Focused on developing and refining strategies and results chains
- Idea of MOU was proposed

## Workshop Outcomes - continued

#### Consensus Driven

4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, & 6<sup>th</sup> workshops (Apr 2018 – Feb 2019)

- Develop a Memorandum of Understanding
- Flow study by USGS was proposed and funded by NDOW, BLM, and BOR



#### Lessons Learned

- Focus on local participation
- Pull together key people who will commit to organizing and making decisions
- Find the right person to facilitate the process
- Get the right people at the table
